Rental Housing

During the 2020-21 Program Year, the City expects to provide gap financing to facilitate the development of approximately 800 units of affordable rental housing. This includes 300 units of supportive housing targeted at the extremely low-income population (e.g., chronically homeless individuals and families and other households with special needs). The balance of 500 units will be financed for the creation of affordable housing for low-income families and individuals.

The City also works to preserve at-risk affordable housing, particularly those properties which have project-based Section 8 contracts that support extremely low-income residents, many of whom have disabilities or have aged in place. Efforts seek to prevent and minimize tenant displacement when affordability covenants or rental assistance contracts are terminated. These efforts are expected to help up to 1,268 households that are extremely low and low income.

<u>Homeownership</u>

During the 2020-21 Program Year, the City's homeownership assistance programs will provide direct financial assistance to achieve homeownership approximately 73 low-income households. This assistance will primarily serve low-income households between 70-80% of area median income, given the high housing costs.

Minor Home Repairs

During the 2020-21 Program Year, assistance for minor home repairs will serve an estimated 265 low income and extremely low income households.

HOPWA

During the 2020-21 Program Year, HOPWA housing programs and services will support 192 persons living with HIV/AIDS and their families who have low incomes in addition to 1,131 persons and their families that report extremely low incomes.
